Research shows:

If we can delay the onset of drug use **O**r diminish the frequency ... We reduce the risk of addiction for that child

Marijuana use during adolescence:

- » Associated with higher risk of drug use or addiction in adulthood
- » Associated with higher risk of abuse / dependence on other drugs
- » Predicts an increased risk of psychosis


Developmental Cognitive Neuroscience

Participants who began using marijuana at the age of 16 or younger demonstrated brain variations that indicate arrested brain development in the prefrontal cortex, the part of the brain responsible for judgment, reasoning and complex thinking. Individuals who started using marijuana after age 16 showed the opposite effect and demonstrated signs of accelerated brain aging.


Adult Vs. Teen Brain



- Most of the activity in the adult brain is in the frontal lobe
 - Thinking, reasoning, planning

- Most of the activity in the teen brain is focused in the center
 - Pleasure reward center

Under Suspicion Testing VS Random Drug Testing

Catch students who are using drugs & alcohol



Deters drugs & alcohol use







Confidential & Non-Punitive





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Under Suspicion vs. Random Drug Testing

Under Suspicion Identification / Punitive REACTIVE

- » 1 to 2 week suspension from school
- » 30-60 day removal from all extra-curricular activities
- » Notification to local law enforcement
- » Inclusion of information in discipline file

Random Drug Testing Deterrent/Early Intervention PROACTIVE

- » No suspension from school
- May be removed from extracurricular activities (usually 1 week - 1 month)
- » Cannot be shared with local law enforcement-Results are strictly confidential
- » Cannot be included in any discipline files

Hunterdon Central 1999 Survey Results

The 1999 survey showed that of the 28 categories of drug use evaluated by the survey, drug use went down in 20 categories. For example, in the highest risk drug use category of "Multi-Drug Users" the rates went down:

> 9th Grade -- 57% decrease 10th Grade -- 100% decrease 11th Grade -- 14% decrease 12th Grade -- 52% decrease

Hunterdon Central 2002 Survey Results

In 2002, following a three-year suspension of the random drug testing program due to litigation, survey results showed drug use was up in 18 of the 28 categories compared to the 1999 data showing decreases in these categories. In the high risk category of "Multi-Drug Users" the rates went up:

> 9th Grade -- 316% increase 10th Grade -- 100% increase 11th Grade -- 52% increase 12th Grade -- 209% increase

Hunterdon Central 2012-13 Survey Results

Annual Hunterdon Central Athletic and Extra Curricular participant and parent survey results indicate that 75%-80% of students and parents "Agree" or "Strongly Agree" with the following statement:

I believe that the RSDT program deters drug / alcohol use during the season or when involved in an activity.



Hunterdon Central 2012-13 Survey Results (cont)

There is a decrease in perceived effectiveness of 15%-20% when asked:

I believe that the RSDT program deters drug / alcohol use out of season or when not involved in an activity.
